Freedom City 2017

Teesdale School is delighted to announce that we have been approved as an official partner of the Freedom City 2017 project to mark the 50th anniversary of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. receiving an honorary degree from Newcastle University.

Teesdale School will co-ordinate a series of Trust wide initiatives that will culminate in an evening of history, music and art in November 2017. The project leader, Dr Simon Henderson, said: "this is a fantastic opportunity for staff, students and parents to engage

with the legacy of King and explore how his message of racial and social justice can be applied today."

Commemorating the themes of Dr King's passionate speech in Newcastle – his final public address outside America before his assassination – Freedom City 2017 explores what Dr King called 'urgent and great problems' all over the world; 'the problem of racism, the problem of poverty and the problem of war'.

Taking place throughout the year, Freedom City 2017 culminates in a series of centrepiece events in November, including Freedom City on the Tyne – an epic, day-long series of performances commemorating historic civil rights marches from across the world.

A special city-wide cultural programme across Newcastle and Gateshead will see Freedom City 2017 events throughout the year at venues including BALTIC Centre for Contemporary Art, Northern Stage, Live Theatre and Seven Stories,

National Centre for Children's Books.

In addition to the cultural events and performances, an education and academic programme - delivered by Newcastle University - will explore the themes of Dr King's speech and bring his legacy to life for a new generation.


Freedom City 2017 features work by international artists, musicians, filmmakers, academics and community

BOOK REVIEW - The Maze Runner by James Dashner

The Maze Runner is the first in a series of books by James Dashner

The story is about a teenage boy named Thomas who enters a maze with his new friends, Newt, Chuck, Minho and Teresa. They have to find a way out. In this book, there is love, mystery, adventure ...and monsters.

This story makes you want to read on and there is nothing that makes you want to stop. 

As summer approaches, we know that our new Year 7s will be feeling a mixtures of excitement and nervousness about starting at a brand new school, but never fear, Joe is here with some top tips to make your first days at Teesdale School stress free...

- **B**uy an alarm clock because the new term will bring an early start and you do not want to miss the bus or registration! Do you?
- **E**at breakfast before school as it is a long time until lunchtime, but well worth the wait!
- Plan your route to school so that you know how to get there and how long it will take. Always try to travel with a friend.

Snapchat warning

You may have seen a warning about a new Snapchat feature - Snap Maps - in the news recently. For any parents saying "Snap what?" this is a very popular social media app on smartphones that is used to share photos and video.

Technically, you'll have to opt-in for the new Snap Maps feature to work, which is the good news. But it is worth checking that your privacy settings are secure as the feature does allow your location to be shared with others, opening up the possibility of people snooping on you without your full understanding or knowledge. We don't need to explain why this is probably not a great idea...

How to turn off Snap Maps

To access Snap Maps you'll need to pinch the screen in the main Snapchat menu where you can see what your front or back camera is shooting. Pinch with two fingers here and you'll be pulled out to your location on a map.

In the top right hand corner you'll then see a cog icon, which is the Settings menu for Snap Maps. If you press here that will then show you an option called Ghost Mode. If you toggle that on, it will delete your last known location and make sure no-one can see your future locations either. That doesn't mean Snapchat won't be able to see your location though.

To ensure Snapchat can't see your location at all, you'll need to head to the Settings menu of your Android or iOS device and make sure the app doesn't have permission to see where you are.

Website updates

Hopefully everyone has seen our new school website - did you know we post lots of useful information on it that could save you time and keep you bang up to date.?

For a start, all class or school-wide non-personal letters sent home are now also posted on the website in the 'Useful Info' section.

You can also find a range of forms, policies and statutory information on the site. For instance, if your circumstances change during the school year, you may become eligible for free school meals. The application form can be found under 'Useful Information'.

Similarly, if you qualify for free school meals, you may be eligible for travel to school on a school bus if you are outside of the school catchment area - the information is on the site under, you've guessed it, 'Useful Information'.

In future, we also plan to put all examination/test schedules on the site

Film review Transformers The Last Knight

The filmmakers try to make some rapid fire jokes, but, like the blast from Optimus' guns, some hit but most miss. The jokes can be clever and funny at times, but they can also seem like they are forced on to you to try and make you laugh. A good thing about this movie is the change of villain rather than constantly relying on Megatron.

This time the villain is a female creator, but the story doesn't explain where she comes from and where she has been all this time. I saw some characters as useless with no relevance to the story such as the young girl; she wasn't in the movie much except in the first and last act.

If you are a die-hard Transformers fan you will forgive the movie its many bad points as it has the usual mix of epic special effects and huge battling robots.

WARNING - spoiler section!!!!! One of my favourite scenes is at the start, set in England in the middle ages. King Arthur is fighting a battle then a massive dragon appears - it seems like a better movie was lurking in that scene! The main character is revealed to be someone called the last knight; we only see him use his ability to summon a sword that can destroy a transformer once, then we don't see any more of this strange ability thoughout the film.

Another example of this is the female character, a descendent of Merlin, who can unlock the staff's power and use its abilities. During the film, we get an amazing flashback scene where we see Bumblebee in World War 2 battling the Nazis with the Allies - again, this seemed like another much better movie.

In my opinion, fans just want to focus on the Transformers rather than the humans, so I recommend that the filmakers just make a movie about one of the fans' favourites which is Bumblebee!

Uni life

Earlier this term, 79 students from Year 8 spent a day gaining a taste of what it might be like to be a university student.

After arriving on the main Teesside University campus, the Teesdale students went off in small groups with students from the university to complete their first activity, which involved visiting key areas of the site, including the library, faculty buildings, student union, accommodation areas and sports facilities. The student ambassadors talked to the Teesdale students about their journeys from school to university, the courses they were studying and general experiences of student life.

In the afternoon, Teesdale students selected a discovery session to attend. These included an introduction to forensic science, where the students visited a crime scene and had to look for clues, and made key fobs from their fingerprints. Katie Jones commented: "It actually felt like I was investigating a real crime scene".

Students taking the chemistry option completed chromatography experiments, whilst those doing engineering made radio controlled cars and planes from Lego.

Another group of students completed a star lab activity where they identified constellations. The final group, after undertaking market research by tasting chocolates, created and presented their

marketing strategy for a new brand of chocolates as part of the choc box challenge.

Mr Trevett, who organised the event with staff from Teesside University commented: "The students seemed to really enjoy the day, and I hope that the objectives of raising student awareness of, and aspirations to one day go to university, were achieved".


Freedom City artwork

A Level

GCE results are published on Thursday 17 August 2017, and will be available to candidates from 8.00am in school. Senior staff will be available to assist candidates with any UCAS or subject problems on the morning of 17 August.

GCSE- Year 11

GCSE results are published on Thursday 24 August 2017, and will be available to candidates from 8.00am in school. Senior staff will be available to assist candidates with any queries regarding Sixth Form applications.

Mrs Robson will be on hand on the day until 3.30pm to speak to anyone who is still unsure or undecided about where they will be studying next. There is still time to apply to the sixth form at Teesdale School and Mrs Robson will be happy to advise you about your options on results day.

Student information for collecting results

If students are unable to collect their own results, the following options are available:

- Send a signed letter in with a 3rd party to collect the results on their behalf
- Leave a stamped addressed envelope with the school office and the results will be posted
- Leave an email address for results to be sent (this will be done after 11am)

Exam certificates

Exam certificates do not arrive into school until November each year, when candidates can call in to collect them. In accordance with the Joint Council for Qualifications regulations, Teesdale School will retain examination certificates for a minimum of 12 months, any unclaimed certificates after this time will be destroyed. Replacement certificates must then be requested (at a cost to the candidate) from the awarding body. However, candidates should be aware that some awarding bodies do not offer replacement certificates but will only issue a Certifying Statement of Results.
