Job of the week

Magazine Journalist

Magazine journalists research and write news articles and features for a wide variety of publications.

Qualifications:

- ✓ University Particularly relevant degree subjects include: English, journalism or media. You'll usually need: 2 to 3 A levels, or equivalent, for a degree/a degree in a relevant subject for postgraduate study
- ✓ College You could take a college course like the Level 3 Certificate in Foundation Journalism. This could be through an apprenticeship or further study. Entry requirements: 4 or 5 GCSEs at grades 9 to 4 (A* to C), or equivalent, for a level 3 course
- ✓ Apprenticeship You can work towards this role through a journalist higher apprenticeship. Employers will set their own entry requirements.
- ✓ Volunteering Competition for jobs is strong, especially with wellknown magazines. Developing a network of contacts is essential.
- ✓ Other Routes You can study Level 5 and above professional qualifications in journalism which are accredited by the National Council for the Training of Journalists (NCTJ). Courses are available online or at a college or training centre. The Level 5 Diploma in Journalism has practical magazine journalism optional units. The NCTJ also offer online and short courses to help develop essential skills like: shorthand, writing for the web, media law and feature writing.

Working hours: 37 to 39 hours a week with variable days and hours

Salary: Average salary (a year) £18,000 as a starter to £40,000 experienced
