
Well done to our chamber choir who gave an accomplished world premier performance of the Dunelm Lux Aeterna at Durham Cathedral.

BOOK REVIEW:

Six of Crows by Leigh Bardugo

Do you ever get bored of reading about good guys whose only goal is to save



the world? If so, then Leigh Bardugo's thrilling world of moral ambiguities and anti-heroes is for you.

Renowned thief, Kaz Brekker, has been offered a job that could leave him rolling in the money. But breaking into the Ice Court is no small feat and Kaz can't do it by himself - he'll need a crew to carry out one impossible heist. Kaz and his crew will risk their lives to make themselves filthy rich, but can they get along (and not kill each other!) long enough to pull it off?

Deliciously devious plots and cunning plans thread together Bardugo's brilliant world of fantasy. The characters within the novel inhabit a sort of moral grey-area where death is no object and money rules their world, making the novel itself very dark and gory. The six different viewpoints the story is written from each give the characters a unique drive for delving into the criminal world. This is what makes 'Six of Crows' one of the best books I have ever read. The depth of character created by seeing them from both an exterior and interior point of view and the mingling of magic and street-smarts seems to be a common theme in many of Bardugo's novels.

I would not recommend this book to younger or less advanced readers. The novel deals with some very serious themes and contains a good deal of gory description. But this all contributes to the creation of Bardugo's intriguing criminal world of magic and lies. I would give this book:

Male staff wear make-up in aid of CALM charity

This term our Sixth Form Student Committee teamed up with male members of staff to raise money for CALM (Campaign Against Living Miserably), a male mental health charity who raise money to help combat male suicide.

Six male members of staff agreed to step outside of their comfort zones and wear make-up all day. Students were invited to sponsor them, with the teacher who received the most sponsorship having their picture shared on social media.

The initiative raised £176 with Dr Henderson attracting the most sponsorship after a last minute donation from Dr Gorlach to spare the blushes (or was it blusher) of Mr Williams.

Men in the UK remain three

times more likely than women to commit suicide, with the most at risk group being those aged 45 to 49. CALM aims to challenge male stereotypes by encouraging positive helpseeking behaviour.

Men are often uncomfortable talking about mental health issues, so the Sixth Form Committee came up with this novel way of raising awareness and money.

The students had a really enjoyable and informative time and it has confirmed their interest in studying law in the future.

Our art department has been extremely busy this term with our talented students. creating some outstanding pieces of artwork


Year 7 artists have developed their watercolour skills, whilst studying a project based on sweets. After looking at the work of American painter, Wayne Thiebaud, students explored different watercolour techniques before applying these skills to create their own gumball machine paintings.

Year 8 artists have been developing their watercolour painting skills too, focusing on the theme of 'Asia' by investigating the meaning of Koi Carp in Japanese culture to create beautiful paintings.

Year 9 artists started an exciting art project with visiting artist, Pollyanna Turner. The project started with a visit to The Witham in Barnard Castle to view its current exhibition, Men's Voices: Stepping Out of the Box. The exhibition examines masculinity by asking how gender stereotypes have shaped males in the north east. Following the visit, students took part in the first of six workshops that build on the underlying themes from their visit. In their first session, they worked with Polly to create mono-prints of people they admire. Next, the students will start investigating different materials and techniques, culminating in their artwork forming part of a body of work to be exhibited at The Witham later in the year. Finally, some students have been putting the new darkroom to use to develop their photography skills by creating photograms, negatives and enlarging their own photos.

Sixth Form enjoy trip to Athens

Last week, six of our sixth form students visited Athens in Greece to work on the Erasmus Lost in Space project.

The exciting project is designed to enable students to study different aspects of astronomy alongside students from Greece, France, Spain, Croatia and Italy.

As well as learning about approaches to astronomy over time in different countries, our students also explored many of the sites of historical interest in Athens. These included the Acropolis, The Museum of Ancient Greek Technology, and the Panathenaic Stadium (built in 330BC and the site of the first Olympics).

The trip is the first of six different weeks of activities spread over the next two years and is another enriching opportunity for students.

Over the next 18 months we will be able to send approximately 1 in 3 of our sixth formers on a FREE foreign study visit. Yet another benefit of post-16 study at Teesdale School!
