### <u>Firefighter</u>

Firefighters help to protect people from fire and other dangers, and give advice on fire prevention.




#### Qualifications:

- College You could take a Level 2 or 3 Diptoma in Public Services before applying to the fire service, although this is not essential. You'll usually need: 2 or more GCSEs at grades 9 to 3 (A\* to D), or equivalent, for a level 2 course/4 or 5 GCSEs at grades 9 to 4 (A\* to C), or equivalent, for a level 3 course
- ✓ Apprenticeship You may be able to start training on an operational firefighter advanced apprenticeship. You'll need to be employed by a fire service to do this. You could train to be a firefighter in the Royal Air Force (RAF). You'll usually need: GCSEs grades 9 to 4 (A\* to C), or equivalent, in English and maths
- ✓ Volunteering Volunteering or working in a support role, for example emergency call handling or fire safety, will give you an idea of what the job is like, as well as access to internal vacancies.
- ✓ Direct Application You can apply directly to join the fire service. Each one sets its own entry requirements. Many ask for GCSEs at grades 9 to 4 (A\* to C) in English and maths, or equivalent qualifications. You'll need to pass: an online test to assess your judgement ability in a realistic work setting and number and reading tests. If you're successful, you'll: do practical selection tests to find out whether you can do the physical tasks needed for the job and then be interviewed.
- ✓ Other Routes You could prepare to apply for a job by doing a Level 2 Certificate in Fire and Rescue Services in the Community. This course is usually run by local fire services and is aimed at people who have some responsibility for fire safety, like housing wardens and fire prevention officers

- 3. FAVOUR open mindedness. Try not to shut down ideas.
- 4. Be open to LEARNING about new opportunities and individual interests but know that you don't need to have all the answers it's about learning together.
- Listen to what is being communicated and reflect UNDERSTANDING back to show you've heard.
- Be in it together. ENGAGE and be prepared to ask tough questions when necessary.
- Recognise your influential role. Be NOTABLE and model the behaviour you want your child to see.
- COMMUNICATE well speak to your child in a way that they will respond to – and at the right time. When they're receptive, show you care.
- EMBARK on a journey to the future together, gradually giving them wings to make their own choices.
