
Year 7 poets

Digging into the past

Year 7 historians are working with local archaeological organisation, 'Dig Ventures,' on a virtual recreation of St. Mary's church in Barnard Castle.

Several students took part in workshops down at the church in the pre-pandemic world of education with the current project designed to allow students to explore the history of the local area in a digital way.

The year 7 volunteers are using a specially designed Minecraft world to build the church as it was in 1500 using detailed floor plans and written documents testifying to

how the church looked all those years ago. The aim is to eventually create a virtual Barnard Castle at different points in the past as part of a wider local history project.



Breeding success!

Our new nature garden is thriving!

Two of our deluxe garden bird boxes were immediately occupied this spring – one by great tits and the adjacent box by house sparrows. The sparrows liked their apartment so much they returned to lay a second clutch which are currently just fledging.

At least an additional four species including blackbird, starling, collared dove and wood pigeon also nested in the school grounds surrounding the garden, so a lot of young birds have been visiting the garden feeders.

The pond has cleared nicely and has a diverse fauna. Yellow flag, water mint, marsh marigold and forget-me-nots have been added as marginals and a dwarf water lily is becoming established.

Garden and wild flowers are attracting insects and we were pleased that an orange tip butterfly was spotted near the cuckoo flowers – the food plant for its caterpillars. At present orange hawkweed (fox and cubs) is striking among the buttercups and ox-eye daisies.

We have recently started a nature club, led by one of our biologists Miss Moks. Our students would like to paint and draw the wildlife, develop the bug hotel, bring on caterpillars for release as butterflies and hopefully look after some rescue hedgehogs that can't be released back into the wild.

2021-2022 could be a busy year!

Wonderful watercolours

Year 7 and 8 artists have (very excitedly!) been back in the art rooms this term and have been working hard to develop their watercolour skills.
