Nurturing nature

Did you know that since the 1950s, there has been a 97% decline in the speciesrich natural hay meadows? And of the remaining 3%, approximately half of these are found in the upland farms of the North Pennines – most specifically Teesdale! As a result, we are keen to learn more...

We are collaborating with the Tees Swale Project which focusses on restoring the diversity of lost meadows and educating people around the challenges faced by upland farmers.

We began the term with Year 10 students receiving an assembly from Kerryanne and Beth, engagement officers from the project, who 'sowed the seeds' about the importance of nature recovery. From here, Year 10 classes each took part in a session where they took actual seeds from rare native species and planted them into pots; making a note of the species, geographic location of the seeds and the date planted.

The next element was a rather chilly but spectacular November visit to Low Way Farm, an upland farm in Holwick. Joined by Kerryanne, Beth and other colleagues, the students took part in some restoration planting activities. They also had chance to interview the farmer to learn about farming in harmony with nature in Upper Teesdale.

Students learnt about traditional practices, which have been passed on through generations in order to support the species-rich landscape. Students will return to the farm in the summertime in order to compare the landscape and carry out ecological sampling.



Thinking about your next steps?

Future options and careers has been a big thing at Teesdale School this term.

As well as learning about specific career opportunities within lessons, some of the activities students have taken part in are critical business thinking sessions in form time, careers drop down day, careers assemblies and Green Careers Week.

This term also marked the launch of our Year 10 and 12 work experience which will take place the week beginning Monday 3rd July 2023. All students from Years 10 and 12 will attend a workplace for five days so they can get fully immersed into the world of work and potential career pathways.

As well as this, our careers advisor, Caroline, joined us this term. Caroline will be completing 1:1 career interviews with students throughout her time here. She also offers a careers drop-in session on a Tuesday lunchtime in the Vibrancy Area.

Lessons from **Auschwitz**

This term saw four of our Year 12 hisotirans complete the Lessons from Auschwitz project with the Holocaust **Education Trust.**

The project involved a series of seminars and a day-long trip to Auchwitz itself. Students will now go on to plan a project to share their experiences with younger students in the new year as part of Holocaust Memorial Day.

One of our students Evie, explained: "I would say the trip was a humbling experience, which made Everyone realise how lucky we are to live in a more privileged society where we aren't judged for our identity. It was also very informative and I have learnt a lot about the camps, especially Birkenau."

Jack added: " Overall, it was a chilling day which really opened my eyes into what life was really like. With previous studies on the holocaust this really put the devastation and the disgust of the events that occurred into

perspective."

Sporting stars

It's been a busy first term of the year in the PE department. We have several committed students who not only participate in lunchtime and after school clubs, but who also compete in local competitions!

In netball, we have fielded teams in the local South West Durham league and to date the year 10 girls remain undefeated whilst the other year groups have had a mixture of wins and loses against some good competition.

In football we have fielded both male and female teams in the South West Durham leagues and the girls have had the opportunity to participate in some indoor futsal fixtures designed to increase girls' interest in the sport.

In cross country we are proud that several students have qualified for the County Championships on the 14th January after representing the school and themselves at the South West Durham Championships held at Barnard Castle School. We are just waiting for the finer details of this new venue to be confirmed.

A team of Year 8 male and female athletes took part in the School Games Indoor Sports Hall athletics at Bishop Barrington. Next up in the School Games calendar is

dodgeball for our Year 9 students in January.

We also have students that are competing at Northern Regional Standard.

In swimming, we have been represented by students participating for themselves and their clubs at the Northern Region Swimming Championships in Sheffield with all students achieving personal bests and top placings in their events. Teesdale Swimming Club is always on the look out for new members...

In archery we are also proud of the progress being made by one of our students who has recently competed and won her category at the Northern Counties Championships. As this newsletter goes to print, she will be attending the Junior Nationals in Warwickshire.

Internationally, we continue to have students that compete at the highest levels in sailing and cycling and we continue to be extremely proud of their accomplishments.
